## RE: Support for FirstNet Reauthorization

Dear Chair Fischer and Ranking Member Luján:

The Waynesville Police Department strongly supports the reauthorization of FirstNet consistent with the statutory framework established by Congress in 2012, and we do not support changes to the governance or management oversight model that has guided its development. Our collective experience reflects decades of operational, technical, and leadership responsibility.

Congress intentionally structured FirstNet as an independent authority with direct public safety representation. That decision ensured that those who rely on the network during emergencies maintain a central role in shaping its priorities and long-term investments. Altering this structure risks diluting public safety influence and introducing unnecessary uncertainty into a system that depends on continuity and stability.

Public safety organizations remain concerned that deviations from the original governance model could gradually transform FirstNet into a conventional federal program. Such a shift would expose the network to changing political priorities and weaken the predictability required for mission critical communications.

The current statutory framework already provides robust accountability through independent annual audits conducted by the Department of Commerce. These safeguards were deliberately balanced by Congress to ensure transparency without impairing operational independence or public safety driven decision making. This framework is functioning as intended.
